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ANTERIOR STROMAL PUNCTURE IN BROWN-McLEAN SYNDROME

Methods: Interventional case reports and literature review.

Results: Ophthalmologic examination showed a peripheral edema and aphakia in both patients. They underwent anterior stromal puncture in an attempt to control the severe foreign body sensation. The procedure proved to be effective over a long-term follow-up.

Conclusions: Peripheral anterior stromal puncture may be considered an effective therapeutic option for patients with symptomatic Brown-McLean syndrome.
